

#### **Meditation: What is our Ideal**

Ex 22; 20-26; 1 Thes 1: 5-10; Mt 22: 34-40

This Meditation will lead us to a question: what is our Ideal? An Ideal is the sum of all of our goals and objectives in life. It is the source of true happiness. It makes our lives worth living and gives us direction, meaning and purpose.

How can we tell what our Ideal is? We should ask ourselves: what do we think about most of the time? What do we spend our time and money on? That is our Ideal.

There was a woman, but I could as easily say there was a man, who we may relate to in some ways. When she was 10 years old, she wanted to be an actor in the movies. She thought that was her Ideal in life. That did work out for her. The point is that our Ideals may change as we grow older and more mature.

As a young woman, she graduated from college, became a real estate agent, married and had children. She thought her Ideal was to be the most prestigious real estate agent she could be. she worked a lot during the week and just about every weekend. She did this to achieve her Ideal but it was to the detriment of her young family who needed her time even more.

She then decided that her Ideal was to make as much money as she could as a real estate agent and by buying rental property. she thought that this would make her powerful and put her in complete control of her life. These efforts took most of her energy, thoughts, time and money. she often missed valuable time with her family.

All these things, becoming an actor, being a real estate agent, buying things, making money, being powerful and prestigious are not the true Ideal that i am speaking about. They are more like goals

While these activities are not bad in themselves, she went a little overboard with them. They became like idols to her. They were false ideals because they would never lead to true happiness and personal fulfillment.

She considered herself to be a good Catholic. She went to Church almost every Sunday and she was very generous with her contributions but she did not feel very close to God.

Then someone told her about the unconditional love God had for her. She was amazed by this. She had always thought of God's love as being conditional: you do this and I will love you, but if you do that, I will not love you. And that is the way she loved her family and friends.

It changed her life. She began turning away from those things that had become idols to her: making money, and having power, prestige and control. None of these things gave her happiness. Also, they were causing problems with family. So, she decided to reduce the time and efforts she spent with real estate and focus more of her time more on really helping people. She became more involved with her Church and committed to spend more time deepening her relationship with her family and God.

While it was not an overnight process, she eventually came to realize that loving God and loving everyone she came into contact with, especially her family, should be her Ideal.

In the reading from Exodus, we are given examples of good goals: be kind to widows, orphans and the aliens living among us.

Back then, the widows, orphans and aliens were vulnerable to abuse and oppression. They were often very poor. They had little or no economic or legal rights in a society that was dominated by men and tribal connections. They had to rely on the goodness, generosity and compassion of others for their survival.

Helping these people is a great example of a goal in life but it is not necessarily an Ideal which is the sum of all the goals in our lives.

In the reading for Thessalonians, St. Paul compliments a new Christian community for their faith in God which was evident in their words and actions. More importantly, they had turned from worshiping idols to worshiping God

In our Gospel reading, Jesus was speaking with the scribes, who were experts in the old Jewish law, called the Torah. They asked Jesus which part was the most important.

Jesus said love God and love your neighbor. He told them that the whole law and the prophets depended on these 2 commandments.

Jesus tells us that this love must engage us totally: our hearts, souls, minds, the very essence of our beings.

We need to make loving God and neighbor our true Ideal. It will become the source of our true happiness. It will give our lives purpose, meaning and direction. It will make our lives worth living. It will give us the peace, joy and happiness that only God can give and it will lead us to Heaven.
