“Marian Month”

Greetings my Brother Knights and families! As we start to get back to normalcy, maybe the “new normal,” we still continue with our feast days and religious observances. One of those is coming up next month in October, the feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, on October 7, 2020.

Apparently, the Church chose October 7th. as the feast day and consequently, the month of October, to honor Mary with the title of Our Lady of the Rosary. This was done in honor of a great military victory that occurred on October 7, 1571. What occurred, was the well known Battle of Lepanto. Pope Pius called on the rulers in Western Europe to defeat the Muslim Turks, the Islamic threat as they were on a mission to conquer the Mediterranean nations, including Rome.

Pope Pius called upon all Christians to pray for Our Lady’s intercession by praying the Rosary in public and asking for the Blessed Mother to intercede for them. The Christian fleet, being totally out numbered and seemingly not having a chance of defeating the Muslims, met the invading Turk fleet in battle, on the first Sunday of October 1571.

While the Muslims were surrounding the Christian fleet, European Christians began to pray for Our Lady’s intercession by praying the Rosary. As it turned out, the brisk fighting by the European Christians broke the hold of the Muslims and they either drowned or were driven to shore during the battle. Because of this, Western Europe, and Rome, were saved, and Pope Pius declared an annual day of commemoration to Our Lady of Victory. Because of this, Pope Gregory XIII, Pius’ successor, established that the first Sunday of October would be the feast of the Holy Rosary.

It appears that the Church wanted to thank the Holy Mother by extending its desire to offer thanksgiving to Her for the unbelievable victory at Lepanto, by making the entire month in designation of Her interceding for the Christian fleet. The actual feast day now is always celebrated on October 7th. of the current year. That is why we should recite the Rosary (technically it is called a “fourth of the full” Rosary as compared to a “complete/full Rosary” which consists of praying the entire twenty decades) every Sunday before Mass and/or at home in October, if not every day of October. Thanking our Mother, Mary, for her intercession.

Each council should get permission from their priest to have a council member lead the Rosary before every Mass, every weekend in October, in honor of Mary. It would be nice to lead and pray the Rosary before every Mass during the week, if possible. I might also suggest that every council pray/lead the Rosary before at least one weekend Mass every week of the year! As St. Pope John Paul II stated years ago about his favorite prayer, the Rosary, it is the greatest Marian Prayer in the Church. He states, “The Rosary does in fact put us in living communication with Jesus...through his mother’s heart” and “beats the rhythm of life.”

National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 1-7, 2020, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. Please lead the effort in your parish to promote vocations. Ask your pastor if you can put the following announcement in the church bulletin. “National Vocation Awareness Week will be celebrated in our country November 1-7, 2020. Please ask Our Lord for more dedicated, holy priests, deacons and consecrated men and women. May they be inspired by Jesus Christ, supported by our faith community, and respond generously to God’s gift of a vocation.”

I know that many councils are struggling to raise funds to support their various charities. The Hibernians across the state have asked their pastors if they could raise funds by collecting for seminarians outside of church. If your parish does not have a Hibernian council, consider asking your pastor if you could do the same for the seminarians to help you raise funds for them.

Does your council have a Vocations Chalice? According to the USCCB, “The purpose of the *Chalice Program* is to encourage families to pray and promote vocations to the Priesthood and Religious Life. The consecrated Chalice is a tangible reminder of this special intention for the Church. The Second Vatican Council highlights the responsibility of the laity to pray for and support vocations. This urgent call has been strongly affirmed in the writings and addresses of both Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI.

Praying for vocations is the most powerful way to support vocations. A vocation is a call from the Holy Spirit, a gift from God that is nurtured in prayer. When we pray for vocations, we lift up to our Father those men and women whom He is calling to follow Him in a very special way. We hope that those who bring the cup home will continue to pray daily for vocations.

Each week at Mass, an assigned family is invited to take the gifts up at the Offertory Procession. At the end of Mass, the family is called by the priest to come forward to receive the chalice bag and a blessing. (This bag contains a consecrated chalice in a wooden chest, a poster of the seminarians to hang up, the prayer card, and stationery to send notes of encouragement to the Seminarians, Priests and Religious). The family takes the chalice home and puts it in a place of honor.

Each day for a week, during prayer time (morning, bedtime or at meals), the family prays for an increase and persever-

From the State Protocol Chairman

Worthy Grand Knights, Faithful Navigators and Members of the State Council:

I know you are not having any or very few guest's but this is a reminder of how to treat them for when things open back up. Please be safe and wear your mask and remember social distance when out and at meetings.

STATE DEPUTY OR HIGH RANKING OFFICER VISIT

When the State Deputy, District Master or other high ranking officer is scheduled to attend a Council or Assembly function, always be sure that he is advised of the date, time, place, purpose, type of affair, and other individuals on the program – including their function, and other pertinent data.

If women are to be present, the State Deputy's wife should be invited. Advise her of the appropriate dress for the occasion and arrange for a ladies' committee to greet and welcome her. Always advise the State Deputy and head table guests of the proper dress for the affair.

Offer to arrange hotel facilities for the State Deputy or inform the State Deputy or guest of the most convenient hotel accommodations. Determine his time of arrival and arrange to greet him. If the affair is not a banquet, arrange for someone to offer to take the State Deputy or high-ranking officer to dinner. Arrangements also should be made for travel to the site of the affair and return to the hotel.

On arrival at the site of the affair, the Grand Knight or faithful Navigator and his committee should again greet the high-ranking officer. He should be properly introduced to the other dignitaries in attendance.

In recognition of his high office, special appreciation should always be expressed to him for his visit to the function. Arrange proper speaking facilities, including podium, podium light and microphone.

The State Deputy is the highest elected official in the jurisdiction and proper attention must be given to seating arrangements. Other high ranking officers need to be seated according to protocol.

If there is additional entertainment after the banquet, a special table for the high-ranking officers should be arranged so that they will be with the Grand Knight or faithful Navigator and other dignitaries.

The master of ceremonies should be provided with a resume of the State Deputy and other head table guests so that he can make proper introductions. If glossy photographs are required for publicity purposes, they should be requested directly from the guest.

If some other high-ranking official, not a Knight of Columbus member or member of a different council, is invited to attend

a Council or Assembly function, the sponsoring organization should extend the same courtesies as those suggested for use with the State Deputy and high-ranking officers of the Order.

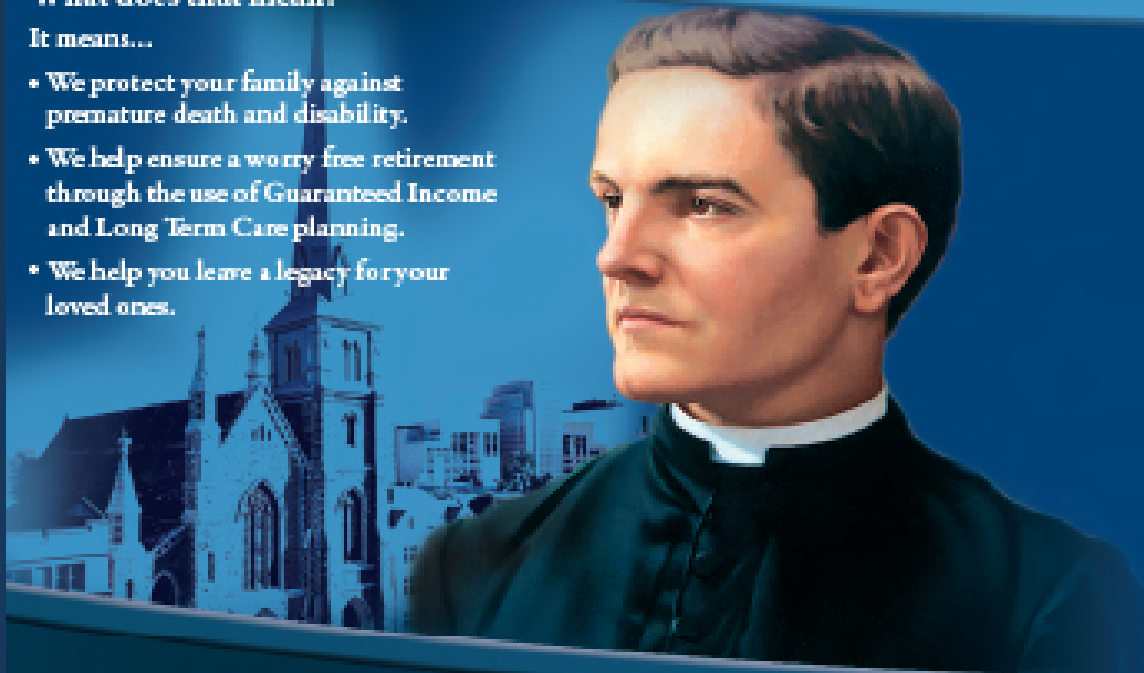
