Mediation for KOC on Making Choices

IS 66:18-21; PS 117: 1-2; HEB 12: 5-7,11-13; LK 13: 22-30

Our Meditation centers on the choices we make.

The prophet Isaiah, who is known as the greatest of all the prophets, lived during the worst of times for the nation of Israel. First, the people had chosen to forsake the one true God and began worshiping idols. They lost God's blessings. Then, because of political infighting, the Nation was divided into the northern kingdom, which was known as Israel, and the southern kingdom, where Jerusalem was located, which was known as Judah. Babylon would eventually conquer the entire nation and exile its leading citizens to Babylon.

Psalm 117 is the shortest of all of the psalms but it is still very powerful. It proclaims that the people of Israel and all the nations must choose to praise God and acknowledge him as their only God. We must choose to go out and spread the word: God loves everybody and his kindness and fidelity is there for everyone.

The letter to the Hebrews has an important message: when we choose to have a relationship with God, he will discipline us, if we need it. He will do so out of love for us. While we are going through this discipline, it may seem like it is a cause, not for joy, but for pain, but later it will bring the peace, joy and happiness that only God can give.

Luke's Gospel makes us reflect on some questions that may come to us from time to time: how many people will be saved, that is, how many people will be with Jesus in heaven one day? Will our children or grandchildren be saved? How about a wayward child of ours?

We all know that Jesus died for us so that we will be in heaven with him some day. He suffered some of the most excruciating pain imaginable for this to happen. He loves us for sure but we still need to do our part, we need to choose to enter through the narrow gate.

Just as with the people of Israel who chose to turn back to God and were redeemed, we will get through the narrow gate if we choose to turn our lives over to God.

We will experience sufferings in this life. They are a part of life. We may be the cause of those sufferings by certain choices we make. We get caught shoplifting a piece of candy from a store or we are stopped for driving under the influence. However, God will be there to aid us in getting rid of our bad habits through a process of discipline, training and guidance when we have a relationship with him.

How do we do that? It starts with a strong and consistent prayer life. We should start and end every day in prayer. I am not talking about hours of prayer, although that would be good too.

We should receive the sacraments as often as possible, especially the Eucharist, which is the source and summit of our lives as Catholic Christians. We should try to visit our brother, Jesus, in the chapel more. We should attend Mass as often as possible. We should love God with our whole hearts, minds, bodies and souls. Just take a moment and think of what that might entail. Finally, we need to love everyone we come into contact with.

When we chose to do these things, we will have a relationship with God and we will be saved. While there is a great effort required to enter the kingdom of God, there is also a great urgency because the narrow door will not remain open indefinitely, think of someone who dies without warning. The last thing we ever want hear is: I do not know where you are from. Depart from me.
