From the Vocations Director

CARA collects the data annually for the U.S. bishops' Secretariat for Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations. The total number of potential ordinands for the class of 2015, 595, is up from from 477 in 2014 and 497 in 2013. Seven in 10 (71 percent) say they were encouraged by a parish priest, as well as friends (46 percent), parishioners (45 percent), and mothers (40 percent).

Approximately 69 percent of the 595 potential ordinands reported to CARA. These 411 respondents include 317 ordinands to the diocesan priesthood, from 120 different dioceses and archdioceses, and 94 ordinands to the religious priesthood. On average, they lived in the diocese or eparchy for which they will be ordained for 15 years before entering seminary. Religious ordinands knew the members of their religious institute an average of six years before entering.

Bishop Michael F. Burbidge of Raleigh, North Carolina, chair of the U.S. bishops' Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations, found that the data gave reason for hope but also provide areas for further growth.

"It is encouraging to see the slight increase in the number of ordinations this year in the United States," Bishop Burbidge said. "When asked about the positive influences they encountered while discerning the call, those to be ordained responded that the support from their family, parish priest, and Catholic schools ranked very high."

Father W. Shawn McKnight, executive director of the Secretariat, cited educational debt as a growing concern. "Over 26 percent of those ordained carried educational debt at the time they entered the seminary, averaging a little over \$22,500 in educational debt at entrance to the seminary. Considering the high percentage of the men ordained already having earned an undergraduate degree, it will be important to find ways to assist in debt reduction in the future."

Among the survey's major findings:

- The average age for the Class of 2015 is 34. The median age (midpoint of the distribution) is 31. Eight in 10 respondents are between 25 and 39. This distribution is slightly younger than in 2014, but follows the pattern in recent years of average age at ordination in the mid-thirties.
- One-quarter (25 percent) were born outside the United States, with the largest numbers coming from Colombia, Mexico, the Philippines, Nigeria, Poland and Vietnam. On average, respondents born in another country have lived in the United States for 12 years. Between 20 and 30 percent of ordinands to diocesan priesthood for each of the last ten years were born outside of the United States.
- Most ordinands have been Catholic since infancy, although

First let me congratulate all the Faithful Navigators for completing their Annual

Fraternal Surveys. This is the first time in years that we have achieved a 100% record by having the surveys completed and into Supreme prior to the cutoff date. I wish to extend my wholehearted congratulations to all those officers and members that supported this effort. Our next big challenge will be the completion of the Report of Assembly Officers Chosen For The Term July 1 2015 to June 30, 2016 that you will be electing for the new fraternal year. This form should be completed immediately after your elections and submitted to Supreme prior to the end of June 2015.

The next, and last of this fraternal year, 4th Degree Exemplification will be held on Saturday, June 13, 2015 in Fort Mill, SC at Saint Philip Neri Catholic Church. Announcement letters have been e-mailed to all Faithful Navigators, Grand Knights and District Deputies. I ask all Grand Knights to work closely with the Faithful Navigator closest to your council and encourage your 3rd degree members to become a 4th Degree Sir Knight with all the honors and prestige this degree holds. We are indeed the visible arm of our Church. As such our work is cut out for us and is needed more each and every day.

At the 129th Supreme Convention in Denver 4 years ago, Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson announced the establishment of a new scholarship program to help fund the education of seminarians preparing to become Catholic chaplains in the U.S. Armed Forces. The program will distribute \$1 million in scholarship money to the Archdiocese for the Military Services, USA, over a period of five years at a rate of \$200,000 per year. These funds, in turn, will help produce a new generation of much-needed Catholic chaplains to minister to U.S. military personnel and their families. Fundraising for the Order wide project will be led by the Fourth Degree. Our goal in South Carolina was to raise \$20,000 over a period of 5 years. I am happy to say that because of the generosity and dedication of all our Knights in South Carolina we were able to achieve that goal in just short of 4 years. However, we need to make just one more push prior to the end of this fraternal year to make one last contribution to this worthy cause. All donations should be made out to Knights of Columbus Charities and in the "for" line on your check make the annotation "Military Scholarship Fund". All of us Knights in South Carolina can be very proud of what we have accomplished thus far but we can do a little better.

Finally for your information, the US Senate confirmed Father Colonel Paul K. Hurley on March 27, 2015, to serve as the

24th US Army Chief of Chaplains. Father Hurley currently serves as the Command Chaplain for the XVIII Airborne Corps at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. His previous Chaplain assignments include deployments to Iraq, Afghanistan and numerous statewide assignments as an Army Chaplain.

Worthy Masters and All Sir Knights:

We still have a long way to go to reach our membership goal for this fraternal year. As of the end of February membership has only grown to 43% of our goal. This means that in the next three months we must take in 1,419 additional members. Fayetteville, North Carolina was the setting for an Exemplification on February 28, 2015 and 37 new Sir Knights joined our ranks. Eight new Sir Knights were welcomed in Puerto Rico on March 8, 2015. We need to have larger Classes if the Master intends to "break even" on his expenses for these Exemplifications. Upcoming Exemplifications will be in Hickory, North Carolina on April 18, 2015; Jacksonville, Florida on April 25, 2015 and May 2, 2015 in Macon, Georgia. Get the paperwork into your Masters ASAP and get the Candidate numbers up in each location.

We still have only gained two new Assemblies in our Province. This is the smallest gain in the past 10 years. Remember, it only takes 30 men to form that new Assembly. I sincerely believe there are still many places in need of an Assembly. If you are considering forming a new Assembly in your area, please notify the District Master of this desire and he will assist you with its formation.

Fraternal Activity Reports are still needed from several Assemblies in Florida, Georgia and Puerto Rico. If your Assembly has not submitted this Report which was due January 31, 2015, then I suggest it be done immediately. Do not require the Master to take action against the Faithful Navigator for nonfeasance of his duty. The Form is not difficult to complete and it is the Faithful Navigator's duty to ensure it is completed and forwarded to those required to get a copy of it.

I am very happy to report that all VA Hospitals and State Veteran facilities in Florida are covered by Representatives and Deputy Representatives in the VAVS Program. I would like the remaining VAVS District Administrators to forward me a current assignment list of their VAVS Representatives and Deputy Representatives for the Knights of Columbus in their

Worthy Grand Knights and Members of the State Council:

The convention is coming and your degree work is not finished. The degree awards will be presented at the new Grand Knights workshop. That means you have until the end of June to meet your goal for First and Second Degrees. Please don't let a few Councils do all the work to meet the State goal for degrees. Get out now and recruit new members and hold a First Degree soon to bring them in to the best organization, the Knights of Columbus.

The attached charts show the status of each council for First Degrees and the Districts second Degrees for 2014-2015. If you have had a degree and the status chart does not show it, ask your District Deputy if he has submitted his Form 450 to the State Ceremonial Chairman. Until he submits his form to the Ceremonial Chairman the chart will not reflect a degree held.

Protocol Input

Worthy Grand Knights and State Council Members, INTRODUCTIONS

Many if not most introductions involve people of unequal or different status or position. They can differ in rank, in age or in sex, but the result is the same: an introduction usually consists of presenting one person of lesser importance or status to another of greater importance or status.

In introducing a group of people to an individual, avoid running through all the names without a break. It is better to introduce two or three people at a time, so that names can register properly. This is where use of name tags is most effective.

A form of acknowledgement used chiefly when meeting a group is repeating the name of the person to whom you have just been introduced.

Before introducing dignitaries at the head table, be certain names are spelled correctly and proper titles are used. It is a good idea to check the pronunciation of any names to be an-

District. I want to see what facilities are completely covered and those with openings to be filled.

Archbishop Timothy Broglio consecrated and blessed Sacramental Oils at the Annual Chrism Mass in Washington, DC. His staff is now shipping vials full of the Oils from the Pastoral Center in Washington, DC to Catholic chaplains stationed around the world where they will use them to administer the sacraments.

nounced. The order of rank should be observed meticulously. A person who has been elected but has not yet taken office is called by the title of that office with --- "elect" after the title. A monsignor is not addressed as "Father" and a State Officer is not addressed as "Brother." Remember, if you don't announce the name and title to the gathering, how can they be expected to know who the person is?

7 percent became Catholic later in life. Eighty-four percent report that both of their parents are Catholic and more than a third (37 percent) have a relative who is a priest or a religious.

- More than half completed college (60 percent) before entering the seminary. One in seven (15 percent) entered the seminary with a graduate degree. One in three (34 percent) report entering the seminary while in college. The most common fields of study for ordinands before entering the seminary are theology or philosophy (20 percent), liberal arts (19 percent), and science (13 percent).
- Half of responding ordinands (51 percent) attended a Catholic elementary school, which is a rate higher than that of all Catholic adults in the United States. In addition, ordinands are somewhat more likely than other U.S. Catholic adults to have attended a Catholic high school and they are much more likely to have attended a Catholic college (45 percent, compared to 7 percent among U.S. Catholic adults).
- Six in ten ordinands (61 percent) report some type of fulltime work experience prior to entering the seminary, most often in education. Four percent of responding ordinands report prior service in the U.S. Armed Forces. About one in six ordinands (16 percent) report that either parent had a military career in the U.S. Armed Forces.
- Eight in 10 (78 percent) indicate they served as an altar server and about half (51 percent) reporting service as a lector. One in seven (14 percent) participated in a World Youth Day before entering the seminary. About one third were involved in scouting as a youth.
- About seven in 10 report regularly praying the rosary (70 percent) and participating in Eucharistic adoration (70 percent) before entering the seminary.
- Almost half (48 percent) indicated that they were discouraged from considering the priesthood. On average, two individuals are said to have discouraged them.

like serving in one of the ministries of church, or handing out Mass cards. Helping your neighbor or visiting the sick. Dozens of items from the handout from our workshop can be counted. 



Andrea Powalie, a member of Our Lady Star of the Sea Parish, and the daughter of Sir Knight Carl Powalie and Janice Powalie is enrolled in the Veterinary Medicine Program at the University of Georgia as a first year graduate student. Andrea has been given the opportunity to travel to the Navajo/Apache Reservation in Arizona and New Mexico over the summer on a mission trip with the Christian Veterinary Mission. While on the reservation, Andrea will be working alongside the Native Americans as a veterinarian, and she will be educating them, performing routine surgeries such as spays and neuters to help control the stray population, helping tend to their livestock, giving vaccines and de-worming to prevent the spread of diseases, thus improving their human health as well as the animals. The animals are their primary way of living and providing for their families. Each day as Andrea works alongside the people, she will be sharing her Christian faith with them through prayer, devotions, and personal interaction.

Andrea is, and continues to be, actively involved in the Youth Group in the Parish when she is home on breaks from school. Andrea's mission on the reservation is twofold: to help the people with the health of their animals, but most importantly, to evangelize to the people and to spread the Gospel to those that don't believe.

At our annual Saint Patrick's Dance, Andrea was among the Youth Group serving at the dance. During a lull in the activities, Council 7122 presented Andrea with a check for \$575 to help pay for her trip with the Christian Veterinary Mission. The monies came from the Council coffers and from the generosity of the members at our monthly meeting.
